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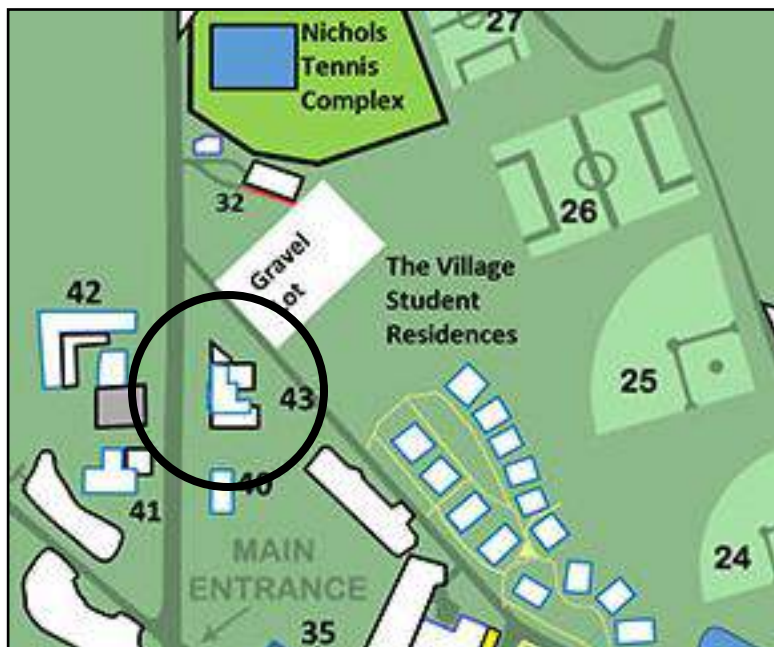

Courses



FALL BIRDING - Class Limit 15

Tom Striker, 6 Sessions, Monday, September 16 - October 21, 9:10 am - 11:10 am, Cost: \$20

This course will explore bird watching as a hobby to be enjoyed at any age and location. After an introduction to biology and behavior, the course will focus on finding and identifying the birds of the southern Appalachian region. Related topics will include field guides, binoculars, and migration. Weather permitting; most classes will be field trips to hotspots in the Young Harris / Lake Chatuge area. One or more field trips (Ivy Log Gap Road and Brasstown Bald) will be scheduled off campus starting before 9 am and extending beyond 11 am. Participants will need decent binoculars and a fairly recent field guide to eastern birds. Beginners are welcome!

Tom Striker has been a birder for over 40 years and, until recently, operated a backyard nature store in Blue Ridge with year-round educational activities such as seminars and bird walks. He has taught ICL birding classes since 2009 and teaches annually at the John C. Campbell Folk School. His first career as a professional forester included 15 years with the Forest Service. He is a member of the American Birding Association, Atlanta Audubon Society, Georgia Ornithological Society, and Fannin County Wing Watchers.

UKULELE 101 – Class Limit 18

Cy Sineath, 8 Sessions, Monday, September 16 – November 4, 1:10 pm – 3:10 pm, Cost: \$20

Where else can you take a class and automatically be plugged into a local “club?” Those who have taken Ukulele 101 have formed a group that continues to play at a local restaurant on a weekly basis. (This is in addition to the class itself.) The ukulele is enjoying a great resurgence in popularity, the world over. This course is an opportunity to learn to play and enjoy the “funnest instrument on earth.” No prior musical experience is necessary, and please, no music theory. Each week, the class will learn new chords, songs, and strumming patterns that build on the week before. By the end of the 8 weeks, participants should be able to play literally hundreds of songs and confidently strum along with ukulele groups wherever they are found. Singing and laughing are integral to this course! Requirements: A ukulele and a willingness to sing and laugh with the group! The facilitator has a limited number of ukuleles that may be loaned until participants obtain their own.

Cy Sineath has been playing the ukulele for 5 years and has enjoyed playing socially with groups throughout the southeast as well as Dublin, Ireland and London, England. Prior to moving to Blairsville in 2017, he played regularly with two groups in the Atlanta area. He feels the ukulele is much like the game of Bridge; you can learn the basics in a matter of hours and then spend the rest of your life mastering it. He now lives here in the mountains with his wife, Labrador Retriever, and more than a few ukuleles.

FALL WILDFLOWER RAMBLES - Class Limit 20

Elaine Delcuze, 8 Sessions, Monday, September 16 - November 4, 3:15 pm - 6:15 pm, Cost: \$24

While you were playing in the summer sun, the trees and plants were hard at work keeping you cool overhead and underfoot. With autumn comes change, and this class will revel in those changes. North Georgia’s diverse vegetation—wildflowers, ferns, mosses, lichens, and trees—will be observed with particular emphasis on individual characteristics within species and their habitat preferences. Due to the nature of botanical rambles and travel time, classes may extend beyond the specified class time. All classes will assemble at the ICL classroom and carpool to the selected field trip site. All rambles are of moderate length and difficulty. So come prepared with field guide, hand lens and notepad to welcome another fall in the Southern Appalachians.

Elaine Delcuze has been a naturalist with Georgia State Parks and a field trip guide with the Georgia Conservancy, Botanical Society and Ornithological Society. She has been involved in the wildflower survey of the Chattahoochee

National Forest and has contributed to the Conservancy's "Guide to the North Georgia Mountains." She is a member of the Preservation Board of the Georgia Mountains Research & Education Center and has done programs and news articles for the Native Plant Preservation Committee.

TREE IDENTIFICATION

Mark Westhafer, 4 Sessions, Monday, September 23 - October 14, 10:10 am - 12:10 pm, Cost: \$18

Note: The first class will meet at the University of Georgia Mountain Research and Education Center

The focus of this course is on the native tree species of the southern Appalachian region. We will identify local trees by understanding their specific morphological characteristics. This geographic area has an abundance of diverse tree species and we will cover many of the basics of how to identify different tree species followed by hikes through local areas to have "hands on" demonstrations and practice. Our primary focus will be on the identification of our deciduous or hardwood trees rather than the evergreen species. Many of the trees we will identify are readily distinguishable by simple characteristics of their leaf morphology but we will also observe bark and flower details where applicable. Additionally, we may discuss using texts or field guides to identify trees, but the primary focus will still be on simple observable characteristics. **The first and second classes will meet at the University of Georgia Mountain Research and Education Center (GMREC) and examine many of the trees on those grounds.** The other two classes will meet at nearby locations where additional tree species can be found. Beginners are welcome and useful items to bring are a field guide and a hand lens (optional). Two highly recommended reference books are "Trees of the Carolinas" by S. Tekielka and "Native Trees of the Southeast" by Kirkman, et al. Except for a short introduction during the first session, this is an outdoor class so please be prepared for relatively easy walks but also the possibility of rain.

Mark Westhafer is a biotechnology science professional and has experience as a patent attorney specializing in biotechnology inventions. He has had a longstanding interest in tree identification, developed while growing up in the Midwest. He has taught many courses in the field of agriculture while in graduate school and enjoys getting back into the woods of North Georgia to enjoy the amazing plant diversity in this area.

THE U.S. CONSTITUTION: POLITICAL PHILOSOPHY AND FRAMEWORK OF PRINCIPLES

Joy Vansant, 3 Sessions, Tuesday, September 17 – October 1, 10:10 am – 12:10 pm, Cost: \$16

We will read and study the Constitution in light of its origins including the Magna Carta, Mayflower Compact, Declaration of Independence, Articles of Confederation, and the Federalist Papers. We will reflect upon the principles set forth by our forefathers to form "a more perfect union" and also present political philosophies which greatly influence our concepts and understandings of government.

Dr. Rhonda Joy Vansant ("Miss Joy") has been an educator for 47 years. Her dedication has taken her into many realms including public school teaching, college and university work, consulting, writing books, speaking at conferences, serving on boards of directors, and now fulfilling heart-felt desires to help America cherish its heritage. She has lived and worked in various places in our state and nation, and is so happy to call this her home.

THE FED AND MONETARY POLICY - BROKEN TOOLS

Dr. John Van Vliet, 1 Session, Tuesday, September 17, 5:00 pm – 6:30 pm, Cost: \$12

Governments typically attempt to promote economic prosperity through a combination of fiscal policy and monetary policy. Today, however, monetary policy is broken. The course will begin with a simple presentation of monetary policy, the role of the FED, and the three traditional tools of monetary policy: the Reserve Ratio, The Discount Rate and Open Market Operations. Then we will look at a new tool, Paying Interest of Reserves, and discover how the fourth tool has crippled the Reserve Ratio and the Discount Rate. We will also note that nearly a decade of quantitative easing has damaged Open Market Operations. We will conclude with speculation and, I hope, discussion about the consequences of this situation.

Dr. Van Vliet is a Professor of Business and Public Policy at Young Harris College. Born at Fort Benning, Ga., the home of the Infantry, John spent his youth as an Army brat and then followed in his father's footsteps by serving 24 years in the US Army. He served in various capacities, such as Commander, Plans Officer, Personnel Officer, Intelligence Officer and Military Attaché. He is proud to claim the 75th Ranger Regiment as his regiment. Dr. Van Vliet retired as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1994 and started his second career in industrial automation and parts distribution. He is now in his third career as a college professor. Dr. Van Vliet is married to his high school sweetheart. They live in Hiawassee, Ga. and have two grown daughters and three young grandsons.

THE RISE AND FALL OF THE CIA

Bob Short, 5 Sessions, Tuesday, September 24 – October 22, 3:15 pm – 5:15 pm, Cost: \$18

The Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) is America's premier intelligence organization charged with the responsibility of keeping constant watch in an increasingly dangerous and unstable world. Award winning historian and author Bob Short will discuss the rise and fall of this sometimes controversial agency.

After retiring in 2001, Bob Short returned to his native north Georgia mountains to concentrate on preserving Georgia's political history. He became the creator of an oral history series entitled "Reflections on Georgia Politics" for Young Harris College's Zell and Shirley Miller Library and the Richard B. Russell Library For Political Studies and Research at the University of Georgia.

AUTOHARP – **Class Limit 12**

Jennifer Cordier, 6 Sessions, Tuesday, October 8 – November 12, 1:10 pm – 3:10 pm, Cost \$18

The title of the folk song, "Simple Gifts" is a perfect description for the Autoharp. This lovely instrument offers beginning players immediate gratification as one simply depresses a chord bar and strums across the strings. Many tunes can be accompanied using only three chords, thus the gift of music can be easily shared with others. Come and learn to pick, pluck and strum the Autoharp as we sing and accompany ourselves to many familiar folk songs. Give yourself the "simple gift" of music!

Materials required: Autoharp (in playable condition), Three finger picks and one thumb pick, Chromatic tuner, Tuning wrench and Music stand. **Note: A notebook with all music and instructional materials will be provided by instructor. A \$10 materials fee will be collected the first day of class.** Contact instructor for autoharp rental information.

Jennifer Cordier has taught many classes at ICL including organic gardening, herb gardening, native medicinal herbs, Zentangle and music classes with members of her band.

Jennifer has been playing the Autoharp for 25 years. She has taught Autoharp at John C Campbell Folk School, Oasis in Blairsville, Georgia and gives private lessons. Jennifer plays Autoharp and performs with the folk band Butternut Creek and Friends.

ELDER LAW

Eddy Corn, 5 Sessions, Wednesday, September 18 – October 16, 10:10 am– 12:10 pm, Cost \$18

Class 1 – ***Do you have a co-pilot?*** This class will focus on the documents you need in place to allow your designated "co-pilot" to assist you in the event of illness or incompetency. Class 2 - ***Putting Affairs In Order Before Death.*** This class will focus on understanding documents needed in place before death, and understanding how non-probate assets are created. Class 3 – ***The Probate Process.*** This class will focus on what happens after death. **Classes 4 and 5 – Understanding Trust Agreements.** This class will review the advantages and disadvantages of a revocable trust. Differences in the laws of Georgia, Florida and North Carolina will be highlighted during the classes.

*Eddy is a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) in the State of Georgia since 1982 and still maintains his CPA license. He is an attorney licensed to practice law in three states – Georgia, North Carolina and Florida. Eddy passed the Florida Bar Exam in 2014 to be admitted to practice law in Florida in an effort to better serve our second-home community. ANTON CHEKHOV AND HIS STORIES

Janice Moore, 3 Sessions, Wednesday, September 18 – October 2, 1:10 pm – 3:10 pm, Cost \$16

Known as a famed Russian playwright, Anton Chekhov also excelled as a writer of short fiction and is known as the "father of the modern short story." This class will focus on his stories, which reveal that he was an authority on human nature in the same way that as a practicing physician, he knew the workings of the body. Read his stories and see why Leo Tolstoy wrote in his journal, "I am glad that I love Chekhov."

*Janice Moore enjoyed a long teaching career in the English Department at Young Harris College, serving as Chair of the Humanities Division for eight years and teaching a variety of literature classes as well as creative writing. For a dozen years she served as poetry editor for Georgia Journal. Her own poetry has been published in many journals, anthologies, and in her chapbook *Teaching the Robins.**

MEDICARE 101

Denise Cross, 3 Sessions, Wednesday, September 18 - October 2, 3:15 pm - 5:15 pm, Cost: \$16

This course will focus on Understanding Medicare and the Primary/Secondary relationship of coverage, understand how various products work together, and how to enroll and change coverage and when it is allowed. The goal is to understand how Medicare works and what options you have upon receiving Medicare. Learn about the penalties that can be given if you decide not to participate in Medicare. Learning to read the Medicare Summary Notice to ensure what is being billed to Medicare is correct. Course materials will be provided for the class from SHIIP (Seniors Health Insurance Information Program).

HEALTHY LIVING

Multiple Presenters, 4 Sessions, Wednesday, October 9 – October 30, 1:00 pm – 3:00 pm, Cost: \$18

Class 1: Presenter – Elizabeth Lindsey, PT, DPT, CCVT

Vestibular Conditions and How to Fall Proof Your Life. The first in our series of informative classes will explore the various conditions that are responsible for falls. Taking the time to plan your activities will help you prevent one of the most prevalent causes of hospitalization in the United States: Falls with traumatic injury.

Class 2: Presenters – Laura Ors, PT, DPT Pelvic Health Specialist / Wayne Barth, PT, DOR

Pelvic Health 101. Covering everything from incontinence to sexual dysfunction in women and men, our newest program focuses on a complex problem facing many patients and rarely ever discussed. We will take a new look at the tricks you can use to regain your control over your body. Preventing Neck and Back Injuries and Improving Your Posture. Too many of us today are victims of technology and the “Lazy-boy” society that we live in.

Class 3: Presenter - Meagan Barnett, OTD, OTR/L

Aging and Brain Fitness. In this class we will learn what it means to lead a “brain healthy lifestyle”. You will learn specific activities, exercises and even foods that can help you maintain your brain function at peak capacity. The presenter will also give you a number of resources for healthy aging and apps for brain games.

Class 4: Presenter – Ron Westfall, PT

We will conclude our series with Lifestyle Management for Optimal Health. You will be educated on the impact of exercise, proper diet choices and how to make positive decisions about your lifestyle. While there is an abundance of information available for us to learn about lifestyle choices, diet choices and even our activity level; it can be daunting to do the research and motivate yourself to make a change in your life.

GETTING TO KNOW YOUR CAMERA & BASIC PHOTOGRAPHY - **Class Limit 12**

Stephan Banakas, 6 Sessions, Wednesday, October 9 – November 13, 3:15pm – 5:15 pm, Cost: \$20

This course is intended to be very basic and will begin by reintroducing the students to their cameras and taking them beyond simple “Point & Shoot”. We will begin by discussing features that most of today’s digital cameras have. This will include various settings and when to use them. **Students are encouraged to bring cameras and manuals.**

We will also cover where and how to save your photos in a way that you can recover them without much difficulty, and most importantly, how to do all of this without using up all of your computer’s memory. A number of other issues, light, shutter speed, aperture settings, and focus, and their interactions with each other will be explained.

Very basic rules of composition will be discussed. There will also be an explanation of “depth of field” and to make it work for you. Shooting long exposures, the use of a tripod and natural light will also be emphasized. There will also be opportunities to actually get out and take some pictures using some of the techniques we touched upon.

Stephan Banakas came to the mountains initially in the 1950’s as a camper and became a resident after his retirement in 1999. He started in photography over 50 years ago, used it professionally in his work, and moved into the digital age over the last 10. Being a devoted fly fisherman and coming into contact with nature’s beauty he stepped back into photography and began specializing in wildflower and landscape photography.

HISTORY OF TOWNS COUNTY

Jerry Taylor, 4 sessions, Thursday, September 19 – October 10, 10:10 am – 12:10 pm, Cost: \$18

Jerry Taylor, Towns County's official historian, will lead this class *passing on* interesting bits of Towns County history. Some topics to be covered will be the life and times of the Hiawasse Academy, the humble origins of Young Harris College, the hanging of Tilmon Justice for the murder of James B. Goddard, and place names left behind by the Cherokee.

Jerry Taylor is a native of Towns County, having lived in the shadow of Brasstown Bald all his life. He graduated from Towns County High School and YHC. He holds degrees from UGA, North Georgia College and University and Lincoln Memorial University. Jerry is retired after 32 years as a teacher at Towns County High School. He is a member of the Historical Society and is Towns County's official historian. His home, known as the "The Organ Loft," features his collection of antique reed organs.

THE COMPOSITION & FORMS OF LANDSCAPE DRAWING

Juli Sibley, 8 Sessions, Thursday, September 19 – November 7, 4:00 pm – 6:00 pm, Cost: \$24

This course focuses on pencil drawing as a way to develop a finished drawing. By using graphite pencil to plan a picture plane, and to separate values to create form and shadows in a drawing. We'll study and learn from artist Theodore Kautzky. His magnificent drawings will show us hillsides, forests, rocks, mountain scenery and more. You will receive copies of his drawings to learn the specifics of creating wood textures (on houses), stone walls, near and far shrubbery and flowers, etc. This artist teaches us specific techniques to create and display nature's changing arrangements in varied light conditions.

The class is suitable for beginner or advanced. **Materials required: 2B and 4B drawing pencils, #2 school pencil and 9x12 or larger sketch pad or paper.**

Juli Sibley is a designer, teacher and writer from Young Harris, GA. As a student at YHC many of her inspirations for art came from the natural beauty of this valley. Her latest book, "Earth Friendly Fabric Design" is available worldwide on Amazon.com. She holds a MA in Fine Art from Western Carolina University. Most recently, she has been a member of the art faculty at Augusta State University where she taught the art history section of World Humanities.

THE FEMININE FACE OF THE HOLY ONE: #METOO

J. Patrick Mahon, 5 Sessions, Thursday, October 10 – November 7, 1:10 pm – 3:10 pm, Cost: \$18

In many indigenous religions, feminine deities are dominant. In Western Christianity, patriarchy has ruled. The Roman Church turned Mary Magdalen, the first witness to the resurrection, into a prostitute after a few centuries. In the 21st century, theologians are rediscovering the divine feminine. Putting a feminine face of the divinity has important consequences. In the interim, Mary, the mother of Jesus, was the feminine face of the Holy One. Repeatedly Mary shows up in apparitions to people who are oppressed and distressed--Knock in Ireland, Guadalupe in Mexico, Cobre in Cuba, Fatima in Portugal, and Lourdes in France. In some cases, syncretism has occurred. Mary has been closely associated with various indigenous goddesses. In essence and symbolically, the Divine Feminine is the face of the Holy One. Biblically, Wisdom has been the face of the Holy One, standing by and witnessing the Creator at work. One class session will be devoted to a study of Trappist Thomas Merton's *Hagia Sophia*-- a poetic celebration of Wisdom, the Divine Feminine.

J. Patrick Mahon, is a happily retired high school principal. He and his wife Joan live in Young Harris and winter in Titusville, FL. Pat has a B.A. in Philosophy and a S.T.B. in Theology from St. Mary's Seminary and University, Baltimore,

MD. He has a M.Ed in Psychology and Guidance from Loyola University, Baltimore. He also has a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership from Georgia State University. He is an avid reader, has travelled widely and has an abiding interest in religious studies and spirituality.
